

Tic-Tac-Toe Choice Menu: Novel Study

Select from the menu and create a Google Doc or Sheet to complete the choice (s).

<p>1. Create a fictional interview video with the protagonist, antagonist, or author where you play the character/author and dress the part. Write a complete script and submit it with the video.</p>	<p>2. Create five (5) character trading cards. On one side, illustrate the character. On the other side, write at least five characteristics of the character and give examples from the book .</p>	<p>3. Write a diary with at least three (3) entries from the point of view of one of the story’s main characters. The entries can take place before, during, or after the book’s events. Remember to describe the character’s thoughts and feelings.</p>
<p>4. Create an interactive digital timeline of events from your book. Include important dates, character introductions, conflicts and resolution, images to represent each event, and links to additional information, videos, etc.</p>	<p>5. Write a one-page review of the book. Include a brief summary that includes an overview of the major conflict (without giving away the resolution of the book) as well as your opinion of the book.</p>	<p>6. Create a playlist with at least ten (10) songs that represent characters, themes, or plot points. For each choice, include a link to the song (YouTube, preferably) and write a sentence or two about what the song represents and why you chose it.</p>
<p>7. Create a comic strip/graphic novel retelling the story in your own words. Be sure to include all of the important characters, exciting events, conflicts, and resolution. Include at least one panel (or page) per chapter.</p>	<p>8. Create a video book trailer for your novel. Remember to include music to set the tone, give a brief summary of the book (central conflict, characters) – but don’t reveal too much. Engage the audience and make it want to read the book.</p>	<p>9. Create a new book jacket for the novel. Consider what imagery/symbolism tells the story of the book without giving away major plot points. Include the front cover, and on the back, include a one-paragraph “teaser” copy on the back, and a brief “about the author” paragraph.</p>
